A significant change in the future of the Foundation will be the transition to a new Executive Director as I have announced my retirement date of December 31, 2025.

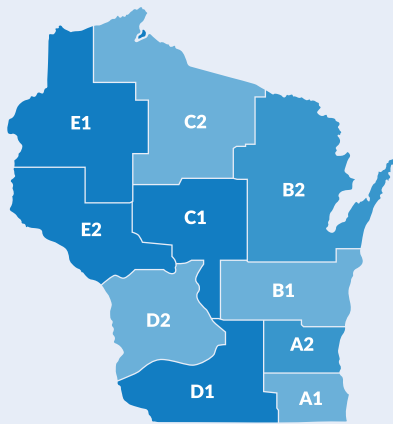

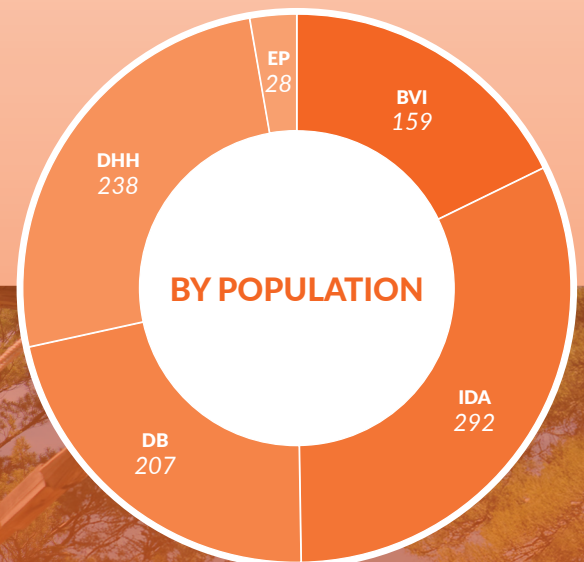
Wisconsin Lions Camp

Since 1956, Lions Camp has been dedicated to providing exceptional camping experiences for individuals with disabilities, free of charge. Our primary objective is to create a fun, safe, and memorable environment that positively impacts the lives of our campers.

In 2024, we welcomed a diverse group of campers across our five camp communities: Blind or Visually Impaired (BVI), Diabetes (DB), Deaf or Hard of Hearing (DHH), Epilepsy (EP), and Intellectual Disabilities or Autism (IDA). Each camp offered tailored activities and support to cater to the unique needs and interests of our campers. We're happy to report we increased our year-over-year camper numbers by nearly 8%, thanks to your promotion of our Camp sessions!

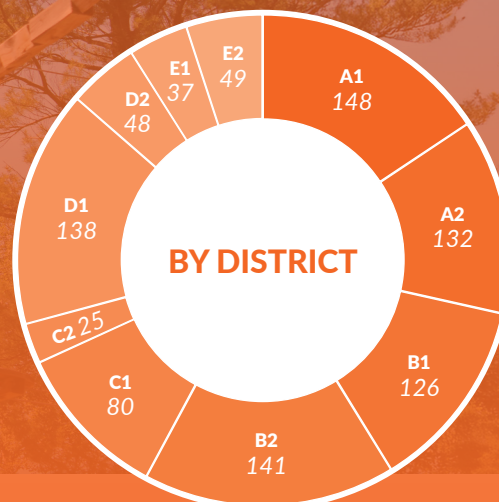

WLF and our partners have created a comprehensive program centered on prevention and risk reduction, with resources and awareness events available annually for our Lions and community members.

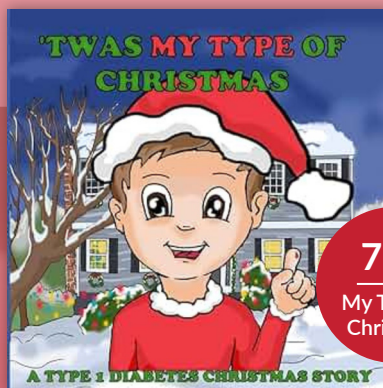

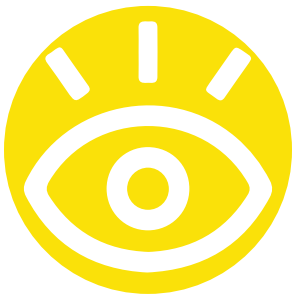

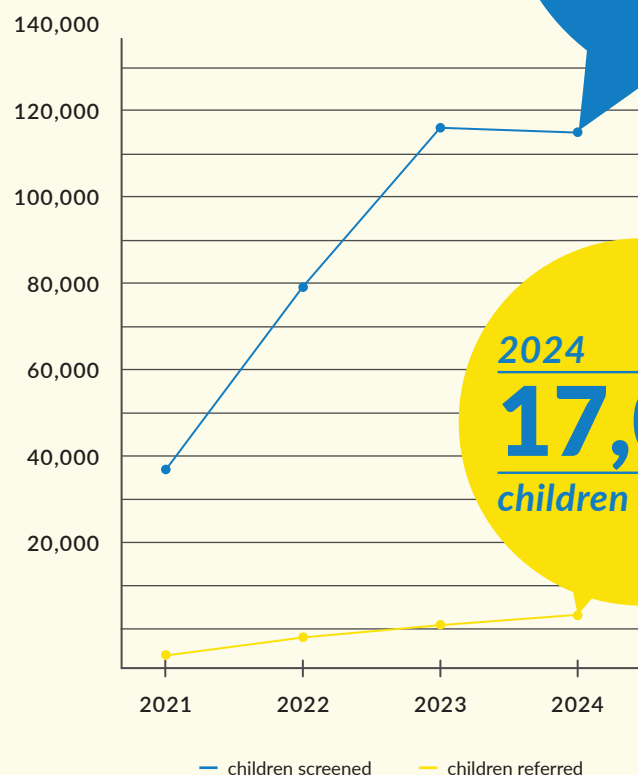
Vision Screening

The Vision Screening Project aims to ensure that every child has the best possible chance to succeed in learning and identifying vision problems that may lead to further issues, if left untreated. Our Vision Screening project is run in partnership with KidSight USA to screen all children ages six months through 18 years, with the emphasis on children enrolled in daycare centers and preschools to catch problems early.

In 2024, we experienced a decrease of 2% in the number of children screened and a 12% increase in the number of children referred for further evaluation and treatment by an eye doctor. We are proud of our certified volunteers for their hard work to reach these accomplishments.

Eyeglass Recycling

The Wisconsin Lions Foundation (WLF) is proud to operate one of only 19 Lions Clubs International Certified Recycling Centers worldwide. Our dedicated team meticulously sorts, cleans, reads and packages donated eyeglasses, ensuring they are ready for distribution to developing countries with limited access to eye health services.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of our local Lions Clubs and their collection sites across Wisconsin, we were able to ship an impressive 210,767 glasses to communities in need around the globe. With a full year of our part-time staff being responsible for washing and reading eyeglasses, combined with new lensometers and Lion volunteers, we were able to process 96,500 eyeglasses in-house.

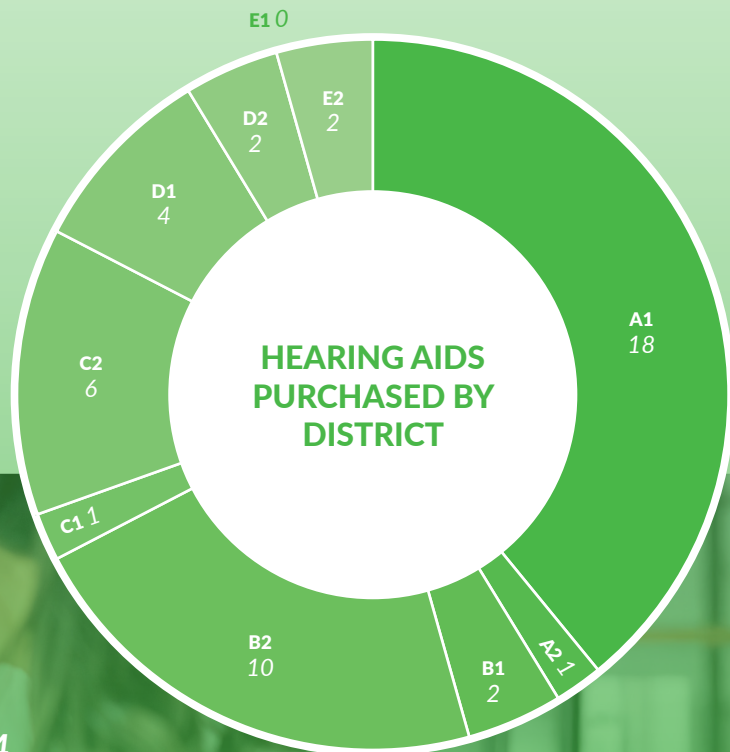

Hearing Project

The Wisconsin Lions Foundation's Hearing Project is dedicated to providing free or low-cost hearing aids to Wisconsin residents who meet our eligibility criteria. Through our innovative recycling program, where we collect used hearing aids, as well as the generous donations from individuals, Lions clubs, and other organizations, we are able to offer this vital service to those in need. In 2024, we received a total of 72 applications.

2024 Year Recap

VISITOR DAYS

2024 was a year of welcoming and growth for tours and Visitor Days at the Wisconsin Lions Foundation (WLF). We worked diligently to update our tours based on guest feedback to provide the best experience possible for those who took the time to come visit us. Some of these changes included extending the Visitor Day program, adding a morning option for Visitor Days and including more department specific staff to present in their areas to get a personal experience with our year-round staff for our visitors.

CLIMBING TOWER & BOULDERING WALL

In 2024, we made some significant enhancements to our outdoor adventure facilities with the completion of a new climbing tower and bouldering wall. These additions offer campers and visitors exciting opportunities to engage in rock climbing activities, promoting physical fitness, personal growth and a sense of accomplishment.

The original climbing tower, built in 1999, was replaced in 2024 to provide an updated and improved climbing experience. The new structure features modern design elements and enhanced safety measures, ensuring climbers can enjoy the activity with confidence. This upgrade underscores the Camp's commitment to offering high-quality facilities that cater to the diverse needs of our participants.

Alongside the climbing tower, a new bouldering wall was constructed, adding a dynamic element to the Camp's adventure offerings. Bouldering involves climbing shorter walls without the use of ropes, focusing on strength, technique, and problem-solving skills. The addition of the bouldering wall provides climbers with varied challenges and complements the existing climbing programs.

EYEGLOSS STORAGE SHED

A new Eyeglass Recycling Storage Shed was built in the fall to significantly enhance the capacity and efficiency of the WLF's Eyeglass Recycling Center.

The new storage shed addresses the increasing volume of eyeglass donations and the need for organized storage space. Prior to its construction, storage limitations posed challenges in managing the influx of donated eyeglasses. The shed provides a dedicated space storing eyeglasses waiting to be processed, as well as finished product waiting to be shipped to missions around the world.

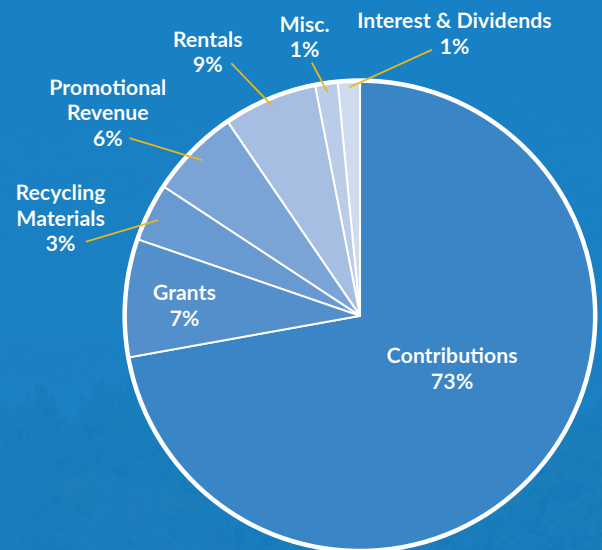

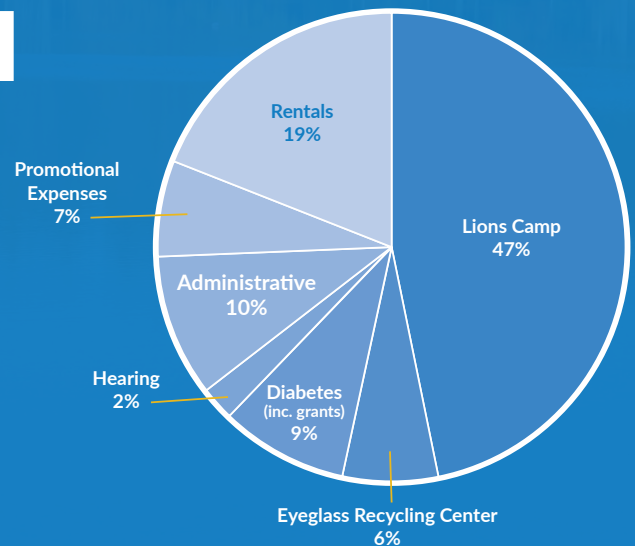
